WHO ARE THE FAMILY ENGAGEMENT EXPERTS THAT ND TRUSTS?

Over the last several years, national experts in family engagement approaches have been consulted and contracted to provide this support throughout North Dakota. While each expert has areas of emphasis, the core of their work promotes overlapping values including communication, supporting student outcomes, partnerships and approaches that honor families. Resources and ideas from each expert can be combined to develop a unique local approach.

Both Dr. Joyce Epstein and Dr. Steven Constantino have provided training and guidance to state and local leaders in North Dakota. These two experts agree that students achieve better outcomes when families and communities are invited into the educational experience alongside educators. Epstein and Constantino have each developed a model of effective family engagement components.

Patricia Weinzapfel has assisted our state's educators in bringing schools and families together through improved communications; messages that prioritize relationships and convey clear information.

Angela Maiers' message of Parents Matter is a call to action for educators, to ensure parents within our schools know they matter by noticing them, helping them to feel valued, and letting them know they're essential.

DR. JOYCE EPSTEIN

KEY MESSAGE: BUILD PARTNERSHIPS TO SUPPORT STUDENT OUTCOME GOALS

Joyce Epstein and collaborators developed the "Framework of Six Types of Family Involvement" in the 1990s. It has been an influential model since that time. Working with the Center for Social Organization of Schools in the School of Education at Johns Hopkins University, Epstein and team have developed an approach using Action Teams for Partnerships to focus on aligning family engagement with student outcome goals. North Dakota has built a team of trained leaders in this approach so each REA in the state has knowledgeable partners to support school growth in the area of family engagement.

The Six Types of Family Involvement are noted in the graphic above.

The NDDPI and NDREAs have worked together to develop professional learning for local communities to establish Action Teams for Partnerships based on guidance from Epstein. Those teams write goal-driven plans for family engagement. Teams that engage in this process can easily see how resources and information from various experts can be combined to support the work.

DR. STEVEN CONSTANTINO

KEY MESSAGE: ENGAGE EVERY FAMILY

Dr. Steven Constantino came to North Dakota's attention as a keynote speaker on family engagement. In his popular presentation he shares his experiences as a high school principal in Virginia experimenting with groundbreaking approaches to open the school doors to families and work deeply on building relationships. His actions were inspired by research about the effects of family engagement on student learning. His professional roles, spanning several decades, have included teacher, principal, district superintendent, state superintendent, and associate professor in Virginia. He has authored five books about family engagement including, "Engage Every Family: Five Simple Principles." Those principles are noted in the graphic above.

North Dakota has hosted keynote presentations and a series of workshops by Dr. Constantino with the primary emphasis on helping educators develop approaches that engage families through relationships.

CONSTANTINO AND EPSTEIN: HOW DO THE MODELS COMPARE?

At the core, both Steven Constantino and Joyce Epstein highlight the same message, that schools must make efforts to know, welcome, and support families to reach the best possible outcomes for students. Their models are strikingly similar. Both experts believe that building a school culture that welcomes and engages families is critical. Constantino promotes a welcoming culture as the first piece that must be put in place in a building and Epstein includes it as one of the three framing goals schools should aim for in their family engagement plans. In a side-by-side comparison of the two models, four more elements can be identified in both models: Communication, supporting learning at home, sharing decision-making, and including the wider community. Two additional elements Epstein identifies as core areas are volunteering and parenting. Although not specifically labeled as categories in Constantino's model, these items do fall under his main premise that every family must be engaged with the child's school experience.

HOW DOES NORTH DAKOTA USE BOTH MODELS?

While Constantino leans into the relationships that bring families into the heart of the learners' experiences, Epstein focuses on helping schools organize teams to create and execute a detailed, goal-focused plan to achieve desired student outcomes.

Over the past two years, North Dakota has adapted Epstein's Action Teams for Partnership approach. Schools build teams of stakeholders to develop their family engagement plans. Step by step they examine existing district strategic improvement plans, identify student outcome goals for culture, academics, and behaviors, and link those goals to the six types of family engagement outlined in Epstein's framework. During the planning process, North Dakota teams consult Constantino's body of work to draw examples and find inspiration from his deep experiences in building strong family engagement culture. Epstein's practical, and Constantino's relational approaches blend well in North Dakota local family engagement plans.

PATRICIA WEINZAPFEL

KEY MESSAGE:

COMMUNICATE EFFECTIVELY WITH FAMILIES

Patricia Weinzapfel uses her experience as a television reporter to help school personnel understand how to use simple, respectful language to communicate effectively with families face-to-face, on the phone and in writing. She worked with a school district in Indiana for a decade as a family and community coordinator. Weinzapfel helps educators examine current school messaging and improve it to build better communication with families. Her focus on the importance of communication development directly supports the models proposed by Constantino and Epstein. Weinzapfel has been a guest presenter in North Dakota.
